FROM THE PASTOR



Divine Anger

Why was Jesus so angry in this Sunday's Gospel? You have to understand how people were stealing money from the poor right in broad daylight in the name of God. First things first, your money was no good in the Temple. The money that was used in society especially Roman coin was considered profane. To give to the Temple, as all were called to do, required that you exchange your money for basically Temple money. The money changers took advantage of this and charged a nice commission in the exchange. Now your money was worth less and if you wanted to change it back there was probably a commission for that too. Of course, you needed a sacrifice to get into the Temple. You needed an animal. Animals to be sacrificed were not allowed to have any blemishes per law. Most animals were not accepted. Therefore you had to pay to buy an animal at the Temple for the sacrifice that was approved by the priests. Don't forget Jesus was against such sacrifices in the first place. Money was passing hands all over the place and the priests were more than likely at the top of the scheme. As you can see, it was quite a money racketing scheme that preyed mostly on the poor all in the name of God. Is it any wonder that Jesus was furious?

Now many people use this passage to claim their own righteous anger in hurting someone else. After all Jesus did it. I don't believe Jesus hurt anyone accept their pride. Sure, he overturned tables full of money and the animals and their cages. I know you might be thinking about the whip. Have you ever cracked a whip in a room full of animals? They run. It must have been a crazy sight to see. Jesus' anger was on full display. Yet, in the midst of it, he offers his life. Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it up.

This begs the question, "does God get angry at us?" We might be quick to point out our "righteous" anger at others, but we better be ready to have that plank (two by four) removed from our own eyes first. What might God be angry at us about? We might be concerned about hot-button sexual sins that we all know. Yet, Jesus seemed to be most merciful when it came to these (see the woman caught in adultery). I think what Jesus could be most angry about is our ignorance and hypocrisy. This seems to be what made Jesus most mad in the Gospels. So, what could he be angry at us about? Could he be angry at our ignorance of the poor? Could he be angry about our ignorance of community? Could he be angry about our lack of forgiveness? Could he be angry about our prejudices? How often have I heard that this is just the way I am when it comes to our prejudices. Not good enough. This might be frightful to examine. Good news though, God might be angry, but I believe there is no wrath in God, no revenge. His anger is about wanting us to change and not just for others, but also for ourselves. He wants what's best for us and doesn't want us to settle for less. If we reject the poor and community, pretty soon it will be all the other imperfect human beings in this world. We are making a nice hole in the ground to live in away from everybody. God is not going to deny us if we want isolation, but that doesn't mean he is happy about it. This gets into a topic for another day, divine sadness. Remember Jesus cried for Jerusalem as he wished he could gather all of us up.

The next gathering will be Tuesday, March 5.



Peace & Justice Supports Archdiocesan Outreach to Migrants

Thousands of migrants from all over the world, mainly Hispanic, have been crossing the Mexican border into the United States. Whether or not one agrees with current US border policy, as Catholics we have a responsibility to assist them in their settlement. Three principles of Catholic Social Teaching apply here...the life and dignity of the human person, a call to family, community and participation, and the preferential option for the poor.



Once crossing the Mexican border, many migrants arrive at Saint Louis before traveling on to their relatives, family, or sponsor locations. The archdiocese, through the Office of Peace & Justice and the Immigration Task Force, has been working to temporarily house, feed and clothe them, and then arrange for further transportation to their destination.

Because most migrants come with little to no possessions, among the items they receive are personal hygiene kits containing toothbrushes, toothpaste, shampoo, soap, combs, brushes, deodorant, lotion, sanitizer, razors... a total of 17 items in each kit. Last year, Sr. Cathy Doherty requested, and Peace & Justice funded and prepared, 100 such kits. These were recently distributed to two busloads of Guatemalan migrants in January.

Upon request, we recently prepared and sent to Rigali Center an additional 100 kits for the next arrival of migrants. Due to funding limitations, we reached out to St. Charles Borromeo parish St. Vincent de Paul conference, who generously provided a donation of \$500. We are very grateful.

The kits are a small gesture of support and comfort to a migrant, but a big reminder that we are our brother's keeper.




